


Soul of Venice

HEADING ONTO THE SILK ROAD

In 1500 there were more than 6,000 looms in operation in the city of Venice. Today, some of the city's wealthy families, such as the Bevilacqua – now in their sixth generation of weavers – continue to keep this tradition alive.

In addition to their exceptional know-how, the Bevilacqua have the added advantage – particularly appreciable to visitors – of owning an amazing wooden loom that dates back to the 18th century and is still in operation. The loom is located behind the showroom and can only be visited by appointment, but the visit offers a truly memorable experience: in a timeless ambiance seven weavers work on velvet, silk, and gold threads using ancestral techniques and patterns that can be found in the historical archives, which include more than 3,500 drawings.

It takes an entire day to make a 30-40 centimetre piece of fabric.



The choice and quality of ingredients is spectacular, and for some it might even be the best *panini* they've ever eaten.



SHOP AT THE WORLD'S MOST BEAUTIFUL MARKET

If you're Venetian, you already know; but if you've only rented an apartment or palazzo for a few days, you absolutely must – yes, *must* – shop at the sublime Rialto market at least once.

Firstly, it's clearly the most beautiful market in the world: buying fish, fruits, or vegetables (all of excellent quality) here along the Grand Canal, right near the Rialto, is truly a rare pleasure. As is enjoying a glass of white wine or a Spritz at one of the nearby bars (like the lovely Naranzaria) after you're done shopping.

Secondly, the market is under threat from the pressures of real estate and tourism. In the words of the grandfather of Francesco Agopyan, of the Antiche Carampane restaurant: "When the Rialto market closes, Venice will be a ghost town."

Despite the apparent disarray. Luigi Frizzo, the owner, knows exactly where to find each book and will guide you enthusiastically through his labyrinth in search of treasures such as *The Little Prince* in Venetian dialect.

For photographers in search of stunning panoramas, climbing the book staircase is an absolute must for a magnificent view of the Venetian Lagoon.

GO ON A MAGICAL SPIRITUAL RETREAT ON AN ISLAND IN THE LAGOON

The island of San Francesco del Deserto is an exceptional place, possibly one of the most beautiful in the entire Venetian Lagoon. To get a real idea of the island and the life of its monks, we recommend doing a retreat there for a few days.

After making your reservation by phone (in Italian only), you'll be welcomed to Burano by a monk who will come to pick you up by boat: there is no public transport to the island.

The retreat, whose days are rhythmically structured by the seven canonical hours, offers a true immersion in monastic life. Between the services, you'll still be free to do whatever you like with your time. The island being as beautiful as it is, most retreat participants go for walks and meditate in the exceptional garden, an enchanting place where long rows of cypress trees form shaded paths.

St Francis of Assisi is said to have stayed on the island in 1220 or 1224.

SOME IMPORTANT PRACTICAL ADVICE

Avoid the period between June and September: besides the heat, the mosquitoes are almost unbearable!

The Franciscan Rule, unlike that followed in Benedictine monasteries for example, does not impose silence. Talking is allowed at meals, with the monks, in the gardens, and so on. So if silence is what you're after, we strongly recommend coming either in winter (when fog over the Lagoon adds to the mysterious and magical atmosphere) or during the week. Women are welcome, as are couples, though you will have to stay in separate rooms. Every day of the retreat features a commentary, in Italian, on a passage from the Bible – or a personal meeting with a monk, depending on the number of guests at the time.
